MINISTER'S WELCOME



Dear friends,

I write this at a time when the little clump of bluebells in our front garden are coming into their prime. Proudly proclaiming their deep blue message of hope, they are not alone in peeping through – the hostas we feared we'd lost last year have also returned in our back garden. Everywhere you look, there are signs of new life springing up. At a time when the natural world is getting its own rest, we are reminded that God's natural order of things hasn't been unsettled by recent events.

A new thing

And as we look back on the last year, we can see the new life that God has been carefully co-ordinating among us, I want to thank you all for the dedication, care, time and prayer you have put into making the last year happen. God has done incredible things through your gifts and skills this year. I've been continually reminded of Isaiah 43:19 this year: 'See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up, do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness, and streams in the wasteland.'

Everywhere we look, God has been doing a new thing. We've seen new ministries naturally springing up – the gift of hospitality found in our weekly Place of Welcome café one of many obvious examples. We've seen the brand new Resources Area launch and a pastoral care team bedding in, which have brought blessing. We've seen a revamped website and social media presence, all of which has brought a freshness which has brought new connections with the church.

We've seen new and developing community connections. Heaton Community Network has begun to make real, meaningful connections between us and Newcastle City Council, the Jobcentre, local housing agencies, the NHS, the police, local councillors and other local voluntary and community-based organisations. I am so excited about the soil being dug here, the groundwork laid and the opportunities this will provide us as we seek to forge new ways of being church beyond our own four walls. We've also seen God doing a new thing within Heaton Churches Together. The birth of Heaton's Listening Line – a clergy-based support service for isolated people has dug deeper roots into an already-strong network. It has been a powerful message to Heaton about the unity we share. Ties have been strengthened with Elim church (and its foodbank), and with St Teresa's (as Father Shaun O'Neill has landed in the last six weeks and thrust himself into ecumenical life). God is doing something within Heaton Churches Together – praise Him for this new and exciting season for us ecumenically.

God has also been at work cultivating children's work in our community. We've seen answers to prayer with the crosschurch initiative of Open The Book now connecting with four local schools and exciting possibilities of school-based Messy Church locally. And I've become a Governor at Chilli Road Primary School. There is much to be hopeful for as we look forward, then.

And, of course, we've seen new faces in our staff. Over the last year, we've seen a whole range of changes in our staff team. We've said farewell to Aaron, Louise, Mark, Marius and Emma as they've moved onto pastures new. And we've welcomed in Vanesa, Shelley, Bryn and Heather, along with new roles for Aileen, Anna and Elaine. As we look ahead, I am really excited about the team that we have in place now. We have gifted, passionate and experienced staff who I know will do a superb job supporting us all as we seek to share the Gospel to Heaton and our wider community.

A new time

God has also been talking to us collectively about a new way of being. We felt the call to stop and take a brave and extensive Sabbath during Lent – a time where we lay pretty much everything down in order to stop and wait for the still, small voice of God. Rotas were stopped, groups paused and the collective journey through a daily devotional guide became the rhythm for a new way of being. It became liberating as we stopped to pray 'what are you calling us to next, Lord?'

And then this time of laying things down took a more intense and uncomfortable feel than any of us had expected. A year ago, we could never have imagined church not meeting physically, or using an online platform that most people had never heard of. But I've been so encouraged about how we've taken to Zoom Church and how we've been able to continue worshipping together on-line.

It has of course also meant that we've had to re-evaluate what is important in church. Pastoral care within the church and the wider community has been an astonishing thing to watch at work. You have done some truly amazing things to bless your local communities, neighbourhoods and fellow church folk. This is truly the Gospel in action, and I have been so humbled to see you at work blessing others. The green shoots of God's church are growing in new and unexpected ways. What a joy this is to see. May this coming year bring so many more examples of God's unexpected and unpredictable hand at work.

And so, as we look forward to this coming year, it is clear that Covid-19 will continue to play a massive part in how we live and love. Things will be different both in church and in the community for a long time to come. We may need to stagger our return into the church building, staggering or streaming services live so people can watch from home. We will need to follow guidance about when and how groups can restart. But more important than all of these is our sharing of the Gospel to our wider community. We have seen nimble, thoughtful responses from people in church and across the community at this time. And as we reimagine what it means to be Heaton Baptist Church, it will be important to continue practicing these skills, being ever-ready to change direction and to follow the winds of the Holy Spirit; and always beginning with the same question – 'what are you calling us to next, Lord?'

Isaiah 58:11 says, 'The Lord will always lead you, satisfy you in a parched land, and strengthen your bones. You will be like a watered garden and like a spring whose waters never run dry.'

The bluebells in our front garden remind me each time I pass them that God is faithful and that His purposes will prevail. It is He who waters, weeds and releases us to show His glory. Praise God that He has been faithful in this last year, and that whatever this coming one brings, He will be faithful into this one, too.

This years ACM report is being written in very different circumstances and our youth programme has looked a bit different for the last month since lockdown began. However, this past year has been another great year in the HBC youth, and we have a group of amazing and inspiring young people in our church, they are a huge blessing to journey with in faith and life! And there is plenty to share with you and be thankful for!

Firstly, we're hugely grateful to the amazing youth team without them we would not be able to do the youth work at HBC. They are a group of servant hearted leaders, and they make the youth programme the fun, welcoming place that it is whilst also creating spaces for our young people to encounter God and grow in faith.

The youth team this year is made up of: Emma Foster, Ben Foster, Sarah Robinson, James Girling, Tim Howell, Rob Taylor, Jack Barraclough, Caz and Tom Onions, Rachel and Jon McNaughton, Jonny and Kirsten Bird and Neil and Lorna Davidson. They're amazing! And a special thank you to Emma, who has been my office buddy for the last 2 and a half years and who recently stepped down from her volunteer role on the staff team, we are so grateful for all she has done in the youth ministry in the last 2 and a half years, and are really pleased she is continuing to be part of the youth team going forward! And to Sarah who has made an exciting move to Birmingham in the last couple of months, we're so grateful for the time she has served as part of the youth team, she has brought much fun and joy, and we're praying for her in this new season!

We love seeing our young people grow in faith, build deeper in friendships with each other, and shine brightly in the world - this is what we're about! And so, here are some stories of what we have been up to this year...

Soul Survivor

Soul Survivor has to be one of the highlights of the youth programme in this year! Last summer a group of 18 young people and 14 leaders headed off to Stafford Showground, to join thousands of other young people and camp in a field for a week! Last summer's soul survivor event was the last one, so it felt very significant to be there and to worship God in that space for the last time. We're really grateful for the impact that Soul Survivor has had on the youth at HBC over the years. We heard from amazing speakers, worshipped together, saw one of our young people make a commitment of faith, were robbed in the football tournament, ate incredible food made by family Bird and had loads of fun. And when we returned home the young people led an amazing service to share all that happened, I will not forget sitting on the platform, on those camping chairs and hearing the young people's stories of vulnerability and what God had done in their lives - that is definitely a ministry highlight -amazing!!

The Oakes

Just before the summer holidays a few of our younger youth went on a trip to the Oakes in Sheffield which is a Christian Activity Camp. They had a great time over the weekend, learning lots about faith and the Bible, and enjoying fun activities like rafting, zorbing, archery and a bonfire. It was my first experience of the Oakes and I can see why is it is an anticipated part of the junior church and youth programme! **New things**: This year we have seen our young people get involved in serving their local community in a gardening project! On a street adjacent to church there were a couple of tired planters that needed reviving and a group of our youth spent time weeding and replanting new flowers and shrubs. We found out that some of the youth know a lot about gardening and with some help from Mark Ridsdale the planter now looks lovely and has been commented on by the local council and community! This year we have also launched a youth worship night. We had our first one in October and invited the worship team from Strathmore Road Methodist Church to lead us in worship, which was great! We heard testimonies, prayed together and had a new youth cafe! We are looking forward to these becoming a more regular part of our youth programme in the future.

HBC Youth on Sundays - On a Sunday morning our youth continue to meet in two groups: Grid and ID. The Grid is for young people in school years 7-9. There are currently around 18 young people in the Grid and we meet in the youth loft. ID is for young people in school years 10-13 and there are around 22 young people in this group. ID meets in the sofa room during the service on the first three Sundays of the month. On the fourth Sunday the young people in ID have the opportunity to serve in an area of the church. You will see them involved in the worship, PA, welcome and Junior church teams on these Sundays, and this is a great space for the youth to step out of their comfort zone and develop their leadership skills. Over the past year the Grid and ID have explored themes such as world issues, the life of Jesus, and Big Questions. More recently we joined the rest of the church in a season of sabbath. Sunday mornings give us a great opportunity to dig into the Bible together, wrestle with questions and explore faith together. There are times throughout the year for our Grid and ID groups to meet together, one of which is the Big Breakfast! At the beginning of each term we join together as a youth community and eat a delicious Big Breakfast made by our youth team. Over the past year we have welcomed Aileen to share what it means to have a life shaped by God, and spent a morning praying for the world.

Mentoring - The mentoring programme for the young people in ID has continued through this past year, and is an opportunity for the young people to meet with a member of the youth team or wider congregation. It looks different for each young person and leader: chatting over a coffee, reading a book of the Bible. exploring a difficult topic together or reading a Christian book. However, the purpose of the mentoring programme is for the young people to be supported and encouraged in their relationship with God. aiftina explore their and to be intentionally invested in by their mentor. One of the young people said they 'love mentoring because it's good to have someone who they can trust and feel comfortable around, they enjoy being able to talk about anything, and that it challenges them to think about how God affects their lives'.

Jesmond Park Academy - We continue to be passionate about the schools work we are able to do in Jesmond Park Academy (Heaton Manor). Over the last year Emma Foster and I have mentored a number of female students, and I was going in to school on a weekly basis to mentor two young people (before lockdown). It is such a privilege to connect with the school and the students in this way and to journey alongside the students in exploring themes such as identity, anger, friendships and confidence.

I am hugely grateful for the continued support, encouragement and prayers from the church for the young people, the youth leaders and the youth programme! It is a privilege to be in the role that I'm in!


STUDENTS

PASTORAL CARE & DISCIPLESHIP

Hello once again. Whenever I come to write this report I can't believe how guickly the year has gone and how much has happened! Most significantly for me, my job role changed this year, moving away from the work with the young people to supporting the pastoral and discipleship work within the church. As much as I have grieved leaving the work with the young people, I know it is in very capable hands and this new role has been really exciting for me. One of the biggest developments has been the Places of Welcome Cafe that started In June. It is wonderful to offer something totally non threatening to the community, and a place that has no agenda other than a warm welcome and good conversation. It feels exactly what we should be doing as a church - to offer the welcome and hospitality to Jesus. You can read more about it in the report from Mike and Viv later on. I've also enjoyed doing much more pastoral care and coordinating the pastoral care team, again a report from Gill follows. It's so good to be a part of a church family that so genuinely cares for one another, and there is so much of this going on around the life of the church. One of the things I am passionate about is equipping people in their journey of faith, and so to be involved in launching our 'resources area' was hugely exciting! The area at the back of the Sanctuary has been transformed into a library area with tons of books, dvd resources, cards and leaflets to allow people to get great teaching and deepen their walk with God. It was wonderful to see it being used by so many in the couple of weeks it was open before we had to stop meeting in the building. It will still be there when we return, do make use of it! Thank you so much to Fiona Veitch Smith for help with sourcing many of the books, and also to Bryn for making it look so good.

Lifegroups - Also as part of my role I have taken on coordinating Lifegroups alongside Andy Carlisle. Lifegroups are so vital to the health of the church. We currently have over a dozen Lifegroups meeting which vary massively in size, structure and focus but all have at the heart of them fellowship and community and a desire to walk closely with others as we seek to become more like Jesus. We have enjoyed our Lifegroup Leaders Gatherings, which now meets 3 times a year to encourage, equip and pray for leaders. I want to extend a huge thanks to all the Lifegroup leaders for their love and commitment to their groups. We had been working on starting up some new Lifegroups, including a daytime group, but the current situation has put that on hold for now. However if you are not a part of a lifegroup, and would like to be, especially during this season that we are scattered, then please get in touch with me. Most Lifegroups continue to meet via video calls, and also are a great source of support, phoning one another and looking out for each other at this time.

Messy Church - Messy Church continues to go well as we seek to provide a gentle, fun, interactive church experience for families and anyone else who wants to join in. Our format remains the same - We start with a Big welcome and tell the Bible story for the day, then all the families go into the sanctuary which is transformed into lots of creative stations and usually a fun game all around the theme of the story. Once people have enjoyed interacting with the story in fun ways, we gather for our celebration time which consists of a song or two, a 5 minute message, a prayer and the Messy Grace. We then head upstairs for a lovely tea and some time to chat to one another. This year from September our theme was 'Superheroes' and we picked a hero or heroine from the Bible each session including characters such as David, Esther and Elijah. Highlights have been families engaging who come regularly to Toddlers and getting feedback from parents who say their children would rather come to Messy Church than other events/parties they have been invited to! None of it could happen without the work of the fantastic Messy Church team who always give their very best to it. A huge thank you to you all.

Our Place of Welcome café opened in September 2019. We built it up slowly, opening every other Thursday lunchtime until Christmas.

It is designed to be a safe, warm, welcoming place where anyone and everyone can come along and have tea or coffee and biscuits or a light meal of home-made soup, bread and cheese, for which there is no charge. The café caters for everyone, lonely or hungry, young or old, singles or families. We have a wonderful team of volunteers who come regularly who will just sit and chat to anyone needing company or who may need help in other practical ways.

This year the cafe has been open every Thursday from 12.00 until 2.00, and although numbers are still small we have seen a steady increase in people from the local community who come regularly.

Just before the lockdown Aileen was contacted by the link worker for the East End Primary Care Network who works with local doctors' practices to support those who have a social rather than medical need. She felt that our Place of Welcome café will provide a safe place for them to meet and talk. During this lockdown the church has been working with her to help support some of the more vulnerable people in our community and we are looking forward to liaising closely with her when the café reopens to continue this support.



BUILDINGS ADVISORY GROUP (BAGS) REPORT

Unless the Lord builds the house, the builders labor in vain. Unless the Lord watches over the city, the guards stand watch in vain. (Psalm 127:1)

Bob Franklin, Michael Stobbs and Tom Pinder have been responsible for the overseeing of the Life Centre, Church and Manse.

Last year we took on the challenge of making the entrance to the church sanctuary more welcoming. This was in response from members in business meetings identifying that the Vestibule area was dreary. Also, the old office at the rear of the church had become a place for unwanted items.

Estimates of the costs of the work were made and the deacons and church agreed for the work to be carried out. With Dave's encouragement and blessing work commenced early last year. We have now finished the Vestibule area.

The Old Ministers office is now completed and is now our New Resources area transformed and run by Aileen, looks very relaxing and well stocked with exciting resources (well done Aileen). Added to this a couple in the church funded the replacement of the under gallery fluorescent lighting for new LED lighting, many thanks for this kind contribution.

We then looked at state of the windows on the eastside of the lower sanctuary, which have been in a very poor state for a long time. It had been difficult finding a glazer due to issues with how the windows are installed (cemented into the walls which caused them to crack, thus having no guarantee). Simon from Heaton Glazers has now completed an agreed pair of windows to test for any issues at £600.00. None issues were identified, and an agreed quote of £3,600.00 for the remaining windows to be replaced. This last year has seen equipment in the Life Centre failing with age and constant use (hot water Heater in the Chillingham Kitchen and currently our Domestic hot water system), replacement costs have come in high, so alternatives are being sourced. The top floor of the Life Centre was repainted in line with our annual maintenance plans. Also, we have had an engineer looking at the movement of the East corner of the Sanctuary and a survey of the drains. As ever, constant week by week management of our properties has gone smoothly thanks to the dedication of the team, the expertise and time they pour into this ministry is a blessing to us all. Special thanks go to Tom Pinder, Michael for their time, dedication and passion for serving the church in this way. Bob, Michael and Tom wish to thank all of the members for their encouragement and support.


