Please join me in continuing to pray for them, thanking God for all that they have given out, and praying that He will restore and replenish them in the year ahead.

Furthermore, almost every area of church ministry is struggling to operate as there are not enough volunteers.

But you know this. You were there. You are there. Thank you. You don't need to read this.

Some might say that this Church Secretary's report is a bit too direct, perhaps a bit too strong. But that's ok because you didn't read it did you.

The ministry is run by Jean and Jeremy Wood. Jeremy's class is online at 7pm on a Thursday and Jean's class is on Fridays 10.30am at HBC.

Pre- covid Jean and Jeremy met with a group of students each week at HBC, assisted by two volunteers. Since then, Jeremy has been giving lessons to two students from Brazil online.

Originally the students were in Brazil, but now they live in Newcastle, but for convenience we still use Skype.

More recently, Jean has been teaching three students at HBC. From Hong Kong, China, and Turkey.

It has been nice, with the new way of teaching, to get to know the students a lot better.

The Brazilian students are both keen cyclists and sometimes ride on Wednesdays with the HBC Velos.



As a church, we are increasingly aware of the detrimental impacts of human activities on the climate, on the environment and on our local & global neighbours. We recognise that climate change is likely to have a catastrophic effect on our own and other species if global temperature rises are not kept below 1.5 degrees. Those who are most vulnerable to the effects of climate change have often contributed least to global warming; for some the crisis has come already.

HBC KIDS By Heather Rogers


The purpose of HBC Kids is to work with the Junior Church leader, and aid in the mission that all children would know that they are welcome, loved and part of the church family at HBC; to facilitate outreach initiatives in the community, local schools and to partner with local organisations; to create resources that aid the wellbeing and the spiritual growth of children, both in the church family and in the community.

Heather Rogers is our Children's Ministry Team Leader, and oversees HBC Kids as a whole. HBC Kids is the wider umbrella which covers community outreach events and initiatives, partnerships with local schools, etc.

Currently, the HBC "umbrella" covers our work with local primary schools including St Teresa's Primary, Hotspur and Chillingham Road; outreach programmes like Growbaby; as well as anything else for children aged 0-11, outside of the Sunday Morning service.

Growbaby was born in February 2022, in the HBC building: this is a provision of free, good quality toys, clothes and equipment for families with children aged 0-5 in the local community. The group runs on the first and third Wednesday of each month, and has had a brilliant start - our team has loved having the opportunity to meet and serve families, and the provision has been a great way to bless. Since February, we have met around 65 individual families through Growbaby, with many returning on a regular basis.

Heather has had a fantastic opportunity to go into St Teresa's Primary School regularly, to facilitate various groups and activities: this has included some "transitions" work with year 6 students as they prepare to go to secondary school; the "Emotional Rollercoaster" course with year 4 and year





5 classes, which focuses on emotional wellbeing; assemblies and a lunch club for year 5 girls, to talk about friendships and to do some mentoring. She has loved the chance to get to know the staff and students at the school, and has fostered some wonderful relationships there.

Dave has also had the chance to work with the staff at Chillingham Road this year: he has focused on being a listening ear for the team, and on providing pastoral care as they faced some challenges.

A year one class from both Chillingham Road Primary and Hotspur Primary have also visited Dave and Heather in the HBC building as part of their RE curriculum, for a talk and a tour; and as a result, Heather has been able to continue to offer support to Hotspur school.

A huge thank you to the spectacular Growbaby team, who have worked hard to get the provision up and running: Paul and Alison Knight, Audrey Gladstone, Viv Weatherley, Heather Skee, Tom Bird and everyone else who has come to support, to organise donations or to chat to parents.

Thank you to Hannah Rai for her fabulous help in running our first Emotional Rollercoaster group at St Teresas.



HBC PLACES OF WELCOME COMMUNITY CAFE

JUNIOR CHURCH By Heather Rogers

Junior Church provides weekly provision for children aged 0-11 on Sunday mornings, including worship, teaching, prayer and play; to enable our children to feel welcome, loved, and a part of the church family, and to help them build strong, meaningful relationships with their peers, with leaders and with the wider church family.

Jacq Howells is our Junior Church leader, overseeing the Junior Church groups on a Sunday morning and co-ordinating the teams for this. Our Junior Church groups meet on a weekly basis: Lasers (school years 5 and 6); Livewires (school years 3 and 4); All Stars (school years 1 and 2); Beginners (Nursery and Reception); and the Creche, for babies and toddlers. We have a great team of Junior Church leaders and helpers, who facilitate the sessions for the children.

After a break from meeting with our groups in person due to covid, Junior Church returned in September 2021. It has been fantastic to see the children settle back in to their old groups and friendships, as well as make new friends, and for new families come into the church family.

We have celebrated with families as they have dedicated their children; we have welcomed new arrivals into the congregation and we have seen children bringing their friends to church and to various trips, which has been fantastic.

Our Kids-Led services have been an opportunity for the Junior Church children to step up and lead various parts of the



service, and these have been received well and blessed the congregation greatly. We've seen the children speak; pray from the front and behind the scenes; join in with the worship group; steward, serve and join in with lots of other areas of church life.


